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Can Croatia diversify its energy sources?

These patterns indicate the potential for diversifying Croatia's clean energy sources and reducing the vulnerability of relying heavily on a single energy type. Croatia's electricity mix includes 27% Hydropower, 17% Wind and 13% Gas. Low-carbon generation peaked in 2023.

Is Croatia dependent on electricity imports?

Croatia is somewhat dependent on electricity imports, depending on hydrological conditions. However this is partly due to the fact that the Krsko nuclear power plant in Slovenia, of which HEP owns 50 percent, also contributes to Croatia's electricity supply but is counted under imports in the statistics.

Does Croatia still need electricity?

Trends from the second quarter of 2025 clearly confirm that Croatia still largely depends on electricity imports, while unfavorable hydrometeorological conditions and the unfeasibility of electricity production from fossil fuels further highlight the limited self-sufficiency of our electricity system.
